ADVISORY TASK FORCE UPDATE

The National Transitions of Care Coalition (NTOCC) is a group of 30 diverse and committed associations who have come together to address the issues and barriers that are affecting quality transitions from one care level to another. It is not about specific individuals or associations but about what is most important to all of us the PATIENT. NTOCC had a busy year developing tools and resources that will support improved communication and build consistency of data elements for transferring patient information during the transition exchange. In addressing those needs to impact change, NTOCC will be presenting a concept paper discussing the concerns related to transitions of care, models that are being developed and statements of consideration for improving processes and communication of patient information. FACTS

- Americans 65 years, with two or more chronic diseases see an average of seven physicians every year
- > 1.5MM medication errors annually and 60% occur during time of transitions
- 19% of patients discharged from a skilled nursing facility are readmitted within three days

- Improving communication between providers, facilities, patients and caregivers including tools and resources:
